#### Karen's Chronicles: April 2022

Well into Lent, we are exploring the complexity of a family who struggles to relate. Luke 15:11-32. This is the story Jesus tells when the religious leaders gossip about him. Those in power criticize Jesus because he shares fellowship and food with people others reject. Luke 15:1-3.

Jesus tells a couple stories before this one, about a shepherd finding a sheep who wanders away and a woman finding a coin that was lost. Luke 15:4-10. They lead into this longer story, where it is not an animal or an object that is lost. Instead, it is a person – or two? or three? – maybe the whole family.

Jesus embodies his message that everyone belongs as he creates a space for all people: God's grace is available to all. God leaves it up to each of us to respond as we will. He loves us so much that he preserves our freedom of choice.

The story Jesus tells shows the younger son and the older son exercising their freedom of choice. Near the end of his telling, Jesus raises our curiosity about what the three men in this family will do next. As people are inside rejoicing with the younger son, the father goes out and encourages the older son to join the party. He tells the older son: "Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found." Luke 15:31-32.

What will the older son do next? What will the younger son do? And the father? We shared our views a few days ago in our Wednesday Lenten Gathering. Each of us is free to choose the next step for this scene, just as we choose the next step in all our relationships.

As Lent becomes Easter this month, we praise God who runs across a field to embrace us with open arms. He forgives us while we are yet sinners: "God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us." Romans 5:8.

I see forgiving as a first step for this family. I imagine the older brother rejoicing with his younger brother and father. Then, I expect they have some long conversations ahead – about how they might repair their relationships, restore mutual trust, and move toward reconciliation. I picture them experimenting with new ways of sharing roles and responsibilities. I envision them creating safe space to relate with each other heart-to-heart, becoming the people God dreams they can be. What a resurrection that is!




#### UMW Call to Prayer and Self Denial Offering:

Family Activities is planning an Easter Egg Hunt with candy, treats and prizes. If you would like to help out, we would love to have donations of:



#### **Notes from Missions Team**

#### A Shelter in Hard Times

The recent displacement of many families from Fairbridge Inn and Suites in Kalispell has drawn attention to the many humanitarian works of the Samaritan House shelter. Several families displaced from the Fairbridge Inn are now living at the Samaritan House.

The Samaritan House opened in 1991 and has expanded to support 90 to 105 guests. Guests receive living quarters, meals and counseling support as they transition to independent living. A case manager is assigned when someone arrives at the shelter. Their needs are assessed, and they are connected with community resources and assisted with finding alternative housing and employment. As a general rule, their stay at the shelter is thirty to sixty days but in some cases the time may be extended

Samaritan house provides employment for 15 people including a kitchen staff.

Plans are underway to renovate and repurpose the former Armory Reserve property which is owned by Samaritan House and located adjacent to the existing shelter. The kitchen and cafeteria area will be upgraded and 16 single occupancy units will be constructed for Veterans. Plans are to construct sixteen 2 and 3-bedroom multi-family units to provide permanent housing for low income people.

Funding for the Samaritan House comes from grants, community groups, fund raisers and individual donations. For the past several years Epworth has contributed to Samaritan House. Recently a portion of the Outreach Mission budget and several individual donations provided an additional \$500 to support the work of the Samaritan House.

Volunteer opportunities are available by contacting the shelter at 406-257-5801 and speaking with Amber or Sonia.

Church Council meetings are open to all people. When church activities are in-person, we meet in the Cameron Room and by Zoom. If you want to Zoom in, email your request to office@kalispellumc.org.

Church Council meets the third Monday of the month at 7:00 pm, although we often skip a month or two in the summer and usually do not meet in December. When all ministries and missions are functioning well, Church Council only needs to meet once a quarter.

#### Church Council Minutes — March 21, 2022

Gary Freebury opened the meeting with prayer.

#### Reports

Stephen Ministry: Lana Shura reported that Stephen Ministry has been active throughout the pandemic. There are ten active care givers. A training class with two candidates is being held. If someone would benefit from a Stephen Minister, talk with Pastor Karen, Lana Shura or Jim Cross. Stephen Ministry plans to host coffee hour on Palm Sunday.

Trustees: Jerry Scott stated that more work will be done on the sidewalk this week. Sandon will bid on finishing the steps. Trustees have consulted with Timco Plumbing to plumb the stairs so they will be heated and no snow shoveling needed. On May 11 and 12, the janitorial company will wax the floors in Van de Mark Hall and the hallway downstairs. Jerry moved to allocate \$950 for a new light in the parking lot that will be Dark Skies compliant. The motion was seconded by Jerry Chipman and carried. Back wall of the nativity scene has been taken down and will be stored.

Finance: Lew Savik reported a \$8,116 deficit year to date. Most of the deficit is from paying all of the churches taxes and insurance for the year. The Finance Committee will be meeting March 30 to review the situation. So far, it looks like March giving will help reduce the deficit.

Day Care Board: Nila Lauder reported that the board members wrote an advertisement for a new director.

Missions: LaVerne Scott stated that the committee plans to have a representative from Soft Landings speak to the church in May. Plans are being made for Native American Sunday March 24.

The rummage sale will be Saturday, April 30, with set up on Thursday and Friday. The items can be purchased after church Sunday. Anything left will be taken away on Monday.

Membership: Janet Ulrich led a review of the first two pages of the church membership list.

SPRC: Sharon Young said that staff evaluations are taking place. On June 27, there will be a congregational meeting with Eric Strader. There was an inquiry about using the church for a dinner and benefit auction. However, the church has not

been able to hold sit-down dinner events to date. Pastor Karen, the Trustees and UMW will confer and set up a procedure/payment guideline.

Music: Joanna Griffin reported for Dawn Hashley. Since moving o the lowest platform of the chancel, two choir members have come back to sing on a regular basis. The choir is more successful as song leaders when the members are closer to the congregation. There is a children's song at the beginning of worship so children and parents can experience a song together in worship. Dawn creates a file of materials for youth to practice during Sunday School.

Education Committee: Carmen Field reported five graduating seniors will receive Bibles. The youth will be at the camp doing clean-up the first weekend in May. May 22 will be last day for Sunday School.

UMW: Robin said that ten attended the Prayer and Self-Denial program held after church. There was a video about Deaconesses and Missioners. The Sunshine Luncheon is planned for May 5.

Worship Committee: Deb Sapp led the following report. Worship Committee invites each of you to grow your faith by participating in Lenten Christian conversations on March 30, April 7 and April 13. Forms to donate for flowers will be in the bulletin inserts on April 3 and 10 and are due April 11. There will be a Good Friday Service about 5:30 with the Church of Christ.

By consensus: There will be an Easter Brunch. Men will probably cook.

Pastor Karen asked what the congregation did together for fun before COVID. Dinners, basket auctions, progressive dinners were mentioned.

Groups are invited to host coffee hours after church. Jerry Scott volunteered the Trustees to host coffee time on March 27.

Laverne Scott will contact Laurie Cummings to see if she wishes to maintain the hall bulletin board.

Pastor Karen closed the meeting with prayer.
