



Karen's Chronicles

The Acts of the Apostles shows Paul's developing understanding of his authority – what gives him status in culture and society, in government and religion. The letters Paul writes show a dynamic interplay among institutional authority, individual identity, and Holy power.

Sometimes Paul appeals to the external authority of religion or government.

Luke tells us when Paul was still known as Saul of Tarsus, before he encountered the Risen Lord Jesus, Saul secured authority from the high priest in Jerusalem to capture "any who belonged to the Way." Acts 9:1-2. Later, after he becomes a follower of Jesus, Paul relies on his status as a Roman citizen. By the authority of citizenship, he challenges magistrates who have beaten and imprisoned Silas and him. When the magistrates want Paul and Silas to go quietly away, Paul confronts them, seeking public accountability. Acts 16:37-39.



What helps you listen to the internal authority of the Holy Spirit, of Christ living in you? How do you share this heart-wisdom with other people? How do you grow as they share their experience of internal authority with you? As we witness to each other, our faith family develops a distinct flavor of Christ living in us.

Listening and witnessing to each other, praying and discerning together – these are first steps in our communal expression of Christ's authority, unique to the people of Epworth UMC. As each one of us gives ourselves over to the power of the Holy Spirit, the Risen Lord Jesus lives in us collectively, growing unity among us. Thanks be to the Holy Trinity!

Mountain Sky Annual Conference news from your Lay Member elected during Charge Conference, Deb Sapp

St. Paul's UMC in Helena hosted our conference. Their Mission statement reads **Welcome to St. Paul's, Grounded in hospitality, Growing in faith, Giving in service and Going in mission...For Good! Transformed people, Transforming the world.** St Paul's UMC was the site of the Worship services and the general sessions.

The Laity sessions were hosted at Covenant UMC located on the east side of Helena. Mayor Wilmont Collins, a member of Covenant UMC, was our keynote speaker. He asked, "How do we get people involved?" If someone says, "I'm too busy." His answer was "Can I help you clear tasks so that you have the time to attend church?" Go where they are to do what needs to be done to help. Ask young people what they need and want. "Don't allow business as usual."

Another inspirational person was the Worship Leader, Jorge Lockward from New York City. He asked us to share "What is my Methodist DNA?" He discovered that for many of us the answer was Brother Van. Jorge is taking Brother Van's favorite song "Harvest Time" back to his home church to be used as the Offertory music. A surprising point was the answer to a question he asked the clergy: What do you need?" They said that Laity don't know how powerful they are because whatever the Laity of each church dreams that's what will happen. The harvest will come from the seeds planted by Laity. We should ask the people "What's working?" and "What's not working?" Then try a suggested change for three months before reevaluating. "Don't quit five minutes before the miracle."

Saturday's service of ordination was deeply moving. We as Mtn Sky Methodists can celebrate 5 persons preparing for ordained ministry, 9 persons ordained or recognized as elders, the commissioning of 1 Deaconess and 1 Home Missioner, plus 2 missionaries.

Ten youth and three chaperones will be going to Silverwood. Hillery will be talking with LaVerne about the youth helping with Feeding the Flathead.


Janet Ulrich reviewed the membership list.
